2012

Rio Cortez

Since receiving the Amy Award last year, Cortez has graduated from the Creative Writing MFA program at NYU. A Canto Mundo fellow and a second year Cave Canem fellow, she has had work featured in *Sugar House Review*. She continues working for Penguin Books, where she is an assistant manager, Trade Sales Analysis & Planning.

2011

Jenny Xie

Xie received the 2012 Narrative Poetry Prize, the Poets & Writers McCrindle online editorial fellowship, and a writer's grant from the Elizabeth George Foundation. Her poetry has appeared in journals such as *Gulf Coast, Narrative*, and *Barrow Street*. She is currently a lecturer at NYU.

Caitlin Doyle

Doyle's poetry has appeared in the *Atlantic*, the *Threepenny Review*, *Birmingham Poetry Review*, and others. She has received scholarships, fellowships, and grants through a variety of sources, including the Bread Loaf Writers' Conference, the Association of Writers and Writing Programs, the Sewanee Writers Conference, and the Association of Literary Scholars, Writers, and Critics. Doyle recently served as the Emerging Writer-In-Residence at Penn State University. Currently a finalist in the 2013 Ruth Lilly Fellowship competition, Doyle will hold a fellowship this fall as a Writer-In-Residence at the James Merrill House. About the Amy Award, Doyle writes: "As an emerging writer, I have learned that seeking validation from outside sources ultimately proves fruitless; it can only come from within, spurred by a sense of conviction about one's own output. But prizes, publications, and other forms of recognition do offer something of rare consequence: encouragement. Receiving the Amy Award in 2011 offered me a vital burst of encouragement at a decisive moment in my life as a poet. What an honor to read my poetry to a packed house at the New York Society Library along with the other two winners! Participating in the Amy Award reading made me feel as if my words had been heard in a fuller way than ever before. My experience as a recipient of the Amy Award continues to galvanize my spirits while I work toward the completion of my debut poetry collection."

2009

Alexandra Wilder

Wilder was born and raised in Toronto and is a graduate of the poetry MFA program at Sarah Lawrence College in Bronxville, New York. Her poems have appeared in *Tin House; Conjunctions* online; *Memorius, Taddle Creek;* the *Texas Review;* and in *Moosehead Anthology X: Future Welcome,* published by DC Books and edited by Todd Swift. Since winning the Amy Award in 2009, her work has appeared in *RATTLE, Interim, Her Royal Majesty,* and *Caketrain.* She is currently at work on finishing her chapbook, *Sister Has a Handlebar Heart,* and is also at work on another series of interconnected poems. From 2007-2011, Wilder was managing director of the 92nd Street Y Unterberg Poetry Center. She is currently a program associate at WritersCorps in San Francisco, a program of the San Francisco Arts Commission and the San Francisco Public Library that places professional writers in community settings to teach creative writing to youth.

2010

Simone Kearney

Kearney's poems have been published, or are forthcoming, in: Boston Review, Stonecutter, Bridge Journal, and Ragazine, among others. She has written a chapbook, In Threes (MinuteBooks 2013), and a chaplet, Room Service (Belladonna 2013). She attended the Josef Albers Foundation residency and the Ragdale residency this year (for art and writing, respectively). She is working on extending an art and poetry collaboration with Christian Hawkey, called "Fatherless Calligraphy," the first installment of which was published by Bridge Journal (and performed at the Poetry Project in Manhattan). She has taught at Rutgers University, Pace University, and Ramapo College, and has a website at SimoneKearney.com. (But she notes that it is currently under construction.)

Annabelle Moselev

Moseley's collection, *The Clock of the Long Now*, was published in 2012 by David Robert Books and made the Poetry Foundation's Bestseller List for Contemporary Poetry in July 2012. Her chapbooks include: *The Fish Has Swallowed Earth* (Aldrich Publishing 2012)

and *The Divine Tour* (Finishing Line Press 2012). She was the 2009-2010 Walt Whitman Birthplace Writer-in-Residence. Moseley founded and edits *String Poet*, the journal of poetry and music, and hosts the New York Times-featured String Poet Studio Series. Lecturer at St. Joseph's College in New York and 2012 Pushcart Prize nominee, Moseley has appeared or is forthcoming in such journals as *Able Muse, Measure*, the *National Review*, the *Nervous Breakdown*, and *Umbrella*. Her poem, "Breakable," was chosen by *O, The Oprah Magazine*, one of twelve featured on Oprah.com for Poetry Month 2011. Recently, the expanded and illustrated second edition of her young adult novel, *The Delaney: Journey to Banba* was released in both print and e-book form by Sheeran Press. About the Amy Award, Moseley writes: "Winning the Amy Award was not only a great honor; it spoke to the importance of legacy in the poetry world. The best poetry, even as it is unique, owes something to the past, to the legacy great poets have handed down. As a young poet, it was a wonderful affirmation to receive this award. It was also meaningful to learn more about Amy Rothholz's legacy and to be reminded that, as writers, we can honor the painful losses we encounter by giving them purpose through the words we shape on the page."

Idra Novey

The year Novey won the Amy Award, she also published her first book of poems with Alice James Books, *The Next Country*, which was a finalist for the 2008 ForeWord Book of the Year in poetry. Her second book of poems, *Exit*, *Civilian* was selected by Patricia Smith for the 2011 National Poetry Series. Her poems have been featured on NPR's All Things Considered, in *American Poetry Review*, *Slate*, *A Public Space*, and *Poetry*, which awarded the poems the 2013 Friends of Literature Prize for poems published in the magazine in the past year. Stein's first full-length collection of poems, *Dispatch from the Future*, was released from Melville House last year. Publishers Weekly chose it for their Best Summer Books of 2012, and it was also a pick for the Rumpus Poetry Book Club. Parks' first collection of poems, Field Folly Snow (University of Georgia Press 2008) was a finalist for the Norma Farber First Book Award and the Glasgow/Shenandoah Prize for Emerging Writers. Parks writes: "I remain grateful to Paula Trachtman and Edward Butscher for establishing the Amy Award, which was an invaluable source of recognition and encouragement at an early stage of my career."

Frances Justine Post

Post's collection, *Beast*, is forthcoming from Augury Books in 2014. Since winning the Amy Award in 2006, she completed an MFA in poetry at Columbia University and received the Discovery/the *Boston Review* Poetry Prize, the Inprint Verlaine Poetry Prize from the University of Houston, and a year-long residency from the Lower Manhattan Cultural Council. Her poems have appeared in *American Letters & Commentary*, the *Boston Review*, *Denver Quarterly*, the *Kenyon Review*, *Pleiades*, and others. She is currently earning her PhD in the Creative Writing Program at the University of Houston, where she is a poetry editor for *Gulf Coast*. Her website is Frances[ustinePost.com.

About the Amy Award, Post writes: "The Amy Award was one of the first poetry awards I had the honor of receiving and the first major reading I had ever done. I was so nervous that I don't really remember my actual reading, but I remember being blown away by the talent of the other women being honored that night. I remember board members and supporters coming up to me (total strangers, no less) who told me how much they enjoyed my work. It was the first real indication that people beyond my family and friends believed in and supported my work. It was a revelation and an honor that I will never forget."

Hila Ratzabi

Ratzabi lives in Philadelphia, where she founded the Red Sofa Salon & Poetry Workshop. "The workshop," she writes, "takes place in my living room and includes homemade food and wine." She is at work on a collection of poems that respond to climate change and will attend the Vermont Studio Center in March 2014 to continue this work. She has poetry forthcoming in the *Alaska Quarterly Review, Drunken Boat*, and the *Normal School*, and has published a chapbook, *The Apparatus of Visible Things* (Finishing Line Press 2009).
